

Today Audrey is Silent No More –

The First of a Series of Articles of the Journey of Post Abortive Women To Healing and Forgiveness through Christ's Divine Mercy Encountered at Rachel's Vineyard

A common metaphor—the elephant in the room. The experience of abortion and its results are excluded from polite conversation. The issue is politically incorrect. It is too polarizing and can tear individuals, couples, families, and communities apart. The Catholic Church teaches that abortion is infanticide, a grievous sin, yet more than one in three regular church-going Americans have been in an abortive relationship—either having had an abortion or being the father or an aborted child. Many of these deeply wounded people have never dealt with its impact on their lives. The following is an account of one woman's experience with abortion, its aftermath, and the miracle of Christ's forgiveness, healing, and His loving call for her recovery and renewal.

Audrey grew up in the affluent suburbs of Ann Arbor, MI. She did especially well in math and science. Though a baptized Presbyterian, her

family never attended Sunday services. By modern social standards, her family was successful. Her parents, working professionals, remain married to this day. Looking back, Audrey recalls that her parents were functional alcoholics—personally distant from her sister and herself. Her upbringing did not include dialogues on dating, sex, children, death, drinking, drugs, depression, or other life issues. There was no active faith to speak of—the family considered themselves Christians, but only as far as checking the "Other Christian" box on government, university, census, and clinic forms. "While I certainly do not blame anyone else for my decisions as an adult, my upbringing left me ill-equipped to deal with life's failures and rejections," Audrey said. "I was able to get by with little effort. I fit a secular stereotype—blond, college educated, wealthy sorority girl—life was pretty good. I learned to be self-sufficient early and became a tough/assertive person when I needed to be. This worked well for me until it didn't."

Audrey looked for men who would be emotionally unavailable to preserve her independent self image. At 21, she was involved in a relationship that met her needs for company and parties. Casual sex was the norm, at least according to the prevalent culture which Audrey embraced, so she followed suit. She became pregnant but refused to tell the baby's father—that would shatter his perception of her as a together 90s woman. She couldn't talk to her sister or parents. Lacking a developed spiritual support system, she did not seek counseling from a clergyman. Nothing led her to see herself or the baby living within her as children of a loving God. Rather, she imagined herself as an intelligent, modern, self-reliant, independent woman, whose life was as it should be, except for this pregnancy. Keeping up this image, this persona she had created, was her life, her religion. She trusted it. How could she possibly be so common (and stupid!) as to allow herself to get pregnant, to be caught in this situation? It simply would not do, it was too embarrassing. "I would avoid dealing with it, pretend it was nothing, ignore the elephant in the room," she says. "I never considered adoption because that would reveal my secret failure." In retrospect, she was ashamed. She was hurt and angry that the persona she created had let her down. She detached herself from her inner feelings; she told no one. Instead, she drove herself to Planned Parenthood and "had it taken care of."

The day of her abortion she was numb. The clinic staff was courteous but offered no counseling or options. Women in the waiting area were quietly reading magazines. Audrey had the sense that "we were there for a manicure, not a life-changing event. It was so odd. We were being led to a spiritual death, to a decision that would haunt us for life." The process of having an abortion, which Audrey refers to as "an assembly line of death," affected her psychologically and physically for years. Racked with unknown, internal feelings of guilt, ambivalence, and self-loathing, Audrey says that the next few years were filled with "ways of coping" that included alcohol abuse, indiscriminant sex, fiscal irresponsibility, and isolation.

At 28, all she had left of her once stellar image was her professional position. After sex with one of her partners, she again found herself pregnant. Back she went for another abortion. "The best vision I can give of the end of my 'pre-healing days' is waking up from days of drinking not being able to brush through my hair, not having taken the garbage out for months—living in complete hell," she said. It wasn't until Audrey's job was in jeopardy when she began regularly calling in sick that she decided to seek counseling. "By the grace of God, the counselor I found was Catholic. In the first five minutes of my initial visit, I told her about the abortion. It was the first time I ever told another living soul." The counselor suggested a weekend retreat at Rachel's Vineyard. She waited until she had 30 days sobriety and then attended a Rachel's Vineyard Weekend.

Audrey's encounter with the healing power and mercy of Christ was transformational. On the weekend, she struggled with other suffering women who sought healing from post-abortion syndrome. "I was able to meaningfully play back the last decade of my life. I finally connected all the HORRIBLE dots. Deep down I always knew with every fiber of my being that the abortions were the source of my misery. Even back in my twenties I knew that this act—a mother voluntarily killing her child—goes against our very creation. Our SOUL knows it, even if our minds mask and ignore it. We are changed forever. Adding avoidance and complete denial of the truth creates a trauma, a time-bomb in the psyche."

She links the organization's Christian message to her ability to heal. "The retreat experience, watching the mercy and healing that occurred over that weekend was directly responsible for my early belief in a higher power. Nothing else could have explained what I experienced and what I saw in others," she said. "That comes from someone who grew up needing tangible proof from math and science."

"So many have not sought healing, have not 'connected the dots' to the impacts of abortion. While we want no abortions to occur, it's critical we get healing from the trauma to prevent REPEAT abortions. I can never undo my decisions to kill my children willingly. What total insanity is it that an educated woman can actually make a statement like that? If I can save one baby, one woman or man from years of destruction, I must. Abortion is irreversible, fixed by neither time nor money. Rachel's Vineyard offers healing, we face the elephant in the room. Abortion wounds can heal, a scar can form. I can allow Jesus to use my wounds as strong weapons for life, for others, for God."

Audrey sought a committed faith life after her Rachel's Vineyard weekend. While she never expected to become Catholic, the more she looked, the more she found that the roads led her to Rome. She received the Sacraments of Initiation and became a Roman Catholic in full communion with the Church at the 2010 Easter Vigil. Now 39, she leads a post Rachel's Vineyard monthly support group, now in its sixth year.

Healing a Father’s Heart

Rachel’s Vineyard is offered here at Martin Correctional Institution. The service it provides for those who attend is immeasurable. However, few really know what it is about. In order to understand what this program offers, one must first become aware of the scourge of abortion.

I’m not writing this article for entertainment or popularity, but to share with you a real-life experience that kept me in the deepest and darkest misery for twenty-seven years. My hope is, if you were involved in a similar situation, that you may find help.

Twenty-seven years ago, as a teenager, I was involved in two abortions because I lived as an irresponsible, arrogant, prideful, selfish, self-centered human being. Those abortions lead me down a road of drugs, alcohol, irresponsible sex, crime and so many other destructive things.

How could abortion lead to all that? Because it produces guilt, whether the person realizes it or not, which turns to bad decisions, self-hatred, anger towards others, violence and all kinds of other messed up emotions. While these are taking place the person is in denial, refusing to recognize there is a problem. Or, if he or she does admit to a problem, they don’t know that it is rooted in an abortion that may have taken place years ago. At the time of my abortion experiences I knew none of this.

I was told that an abortion is simply getting rid of a glob of cells or tissue, that it was not killing a baby. Let’s look at some facts. Day one: the sperm fertilizes the egg in the fallopian tube; forty-six chromosomes combine which predetermines all of the person’s characteristics. By day eighteen there is a heartbeat. At eight weeks all the body systems are present. The baby is rapidly growing. The genital organs are clearly differentiated in sixteen weeks and the baby grasps with hands, kicks, and turns. This is not a blob of tissue, but clearly a little human being.

Abortion has been a divisive topic long before the 1973 Supreme Court decision in Roe v. Wade made it legal. Two of the biggest arguing points

are a mother's "right to choose" and the baby's "right to life." Rarely does the father even get a say in the argument even though twenty-three of those chromosomes are his and the rest of his life is affected by the decision.

Every day 4,300 babies are killed by abortion. It is said that one in every three adults has been involved in an abortion. If you're one of them, and if you're like I was, maybe you hate yourself or your spouse or girlfriend or even your parents. Perhaps you're mad at the doctor or God or experiencing every messed up emotion that could entangle a person's life. I was.

Humans are not designed to carry burdens alone, and we don't have to. There is hope, and there is help to heal from the brutality of abortion. That's what Rachel's Vineyard does. It is led by Donna and Tom, two of the most awesome people I've ever met. They have love and a great passion for what they do and for the men and women inside and outside who have experienced the devastating tragedy of abortion. They can help mend the affects of years of wrong choices and destructive behavior.

Even if you don't fully understand some of what I've said – how an abortion that happened years ago could be responsible for so much destructive behavior – come and check it out and learn. Take a step forward and give yourself a new beginning. Attending a Rachel's Vineyard Retreat will be a life changing experience for the good.

Researchers Banned from Giving Presentations at International Medical Conference

Months ago, researchers from the American Association of Pro-life Ob/Gyn's (AAPLOG) were invited to give presentations on abortion complications at the Medical Women's International Association (MWIA), held this year in South Korea. When they arrived in Seoul, they found themselves in an extremely hostile environment.

Dr. Mary Davenport, one of the banned presenters, sent us the presenters' account of the events in Korea and we are sharing it with you. Please pass this on to others to help get the word out about this incident.

Dr. Davenport's Report

Here is a first-hand account of the incivilities and bullying endured by AAPLOG female doctors at the hands of MWIA officials in Seoul, Korea two days ago. The presentations were described by MWIA as "unscientific" and "political." You may be the judge.

This account was written by the 3 AAPLOG female doctors involved:

Three female physicians, Donna Harrison, Mary Davenport, and Martha Shuping were invited months ago to give lectures on complications of abortion for the MWIA, the Medical Women's International Association.

Donna Harrison's presentation demonstrated that nations with laws protective of mothers and unborn babies have excellent maternal mortality statistics.

Mary Davenport had a talk about abortion as a risk factor for preterm birth in subsequent pregnancies, the cause of 15 million neonatal deaths each year internationally.

Martha Shuping had a presentation that included two case reports of women who suffered severe psychological harm from abortion, even though they had obvious risk factors that were not discussed in the informed consent process. These risk factors were actually quoted from an abortion provider textbook endorsed by the National Abortion Federation.

This was valuable information for physicians to hear, especially those from developing nations who are under tremendous pressure to legalize abortion due to the false belief that legalized abortion is a panacea for

maternal mortality.

However, our presentations were cancelled at the last minute. This was not a total shock to us because many physicians and scientists have long been hampered in attempts to inform the scientific community and patients about risks of abortion.

Very important information has been suppressed and even lied about. With the cancellation of our talks, our host, Anna Choi, head of a group of 680 Korean Ob/Gyn physicians who stopped performing abortions, decided to set up a radio and newspaper interview for us during the time that we were supposed to present.

When we got to the "radio" interview that Anna had set up, it was actually a television interview, and a newspaper reporter was there also.

They put the three of us up front like a "panel" discussion, and the reporters started asking us questions about our presentation, allowing us an opportunity to talk about what we came to present.

About 20 minutes into the interview, the Secretary General of MIWA, a Canadian woman, burst into the room (I kid you not. All of this is on camera), came up to the table and said, "What presentation is this?" Donna Harrison said, "It's not a presentation." So she snarled, "Why are you being interviewed?" At that point, the answers were left to Anna, our host. Anna said that this was a requested interview by the press.

The Secretary General then said, "Who gave you permission to interview these people?" And the reporters said, "We are the press; we don't need anyone's permission. We have freedom of the press." The Secretary General snarled at Anna and said, "Did you arrange this? Did you talk to the organizing committee?" Anna said, "I am on the organizing committee. I don't need to talk to anyone." The Secretary General stood in front of the camera, refused to move and said, "The interview is over." Then the reporters said, "You can't do this. We have the freedom of the press. You are interfering with the freedom of the press." But the Secretary General would not move and said, "The interview is over."

We exited to the hall where a Belgian and a German woman were waiting. They started to make fun of the Korean translator and to snap pictures in her face. And she said, "You can't do this. This is my country. I will call the police." They actually grabbed at her and then one of the Korean reporters put a huge camera in the Belgian woman's face and started taking photos of her. A fistfight almost ensued between the women, but another of the Koreans stepped in and kept any contact from happening. All of this was on camera.

Then our Korean hosts ushered us down the hall and down the elevator along with the reporters and camera crew. We resumed the interview in the commons area downstairs by the trash cans and the bathroom. We were able to complete the entire interview and instead of our audience

being a few female doctors from the conference, we now have an audience of probably a few thousand.

It was an incredible display of arrogance on the part of the Canadian, US, and European physicians at the MWIA who initiated preventing us from speaking. It will be interesting to see what press picks this up. I just wish it would go viral. It's such a glaring example of suppression of information.


