## God's Mercy is Real By Deacon Mark Armamentos Sr.

Saint Peter tells us today to "Always be ready to give a reason for our hope." He had good reasons to give for his hope. He had followed Jesus for years. He'd witnessed Jesus heal lepers and raise others from the dead. Peter watched Him drive out demons and was there when Jesus commanded the wind to stop, calming the raging sea. Great as all these, and many more things were, perhaps the greatest reason Peter had to give for his hope, was that he knew firsthand, the immense mercy of our Lord.

After The Last Supper when Jesus was taken away by armed guards, Peter and the other apostles scattered and abandoned Jesus. Peter, the one whom Jesus had called the rock upon which He would build His Church, the same Peter who just hours earlier had told Jesus that even if he had to die with Him, he would never leave His side, it was this Peter who denied that He even knew Jesus, not once, not twice, but three times.

Can you imagine how awful he must have felt? In that moment, Peter was filled with the spirit of fear, and ran off to warm himself by a coal fire while Jesus was being mocked and beaten, anticipating his impending hideous death.

After the Resurrection, Jesus appeared to the apostles by a coal fire on the shore of the Sea of Galilee. Without any reprimand over Peter's denials, Jesus gives Peter the

opportunity to undo them. He asks Peter three times, “Do you love me?” And Peter confirms three times that yes, he loves Jesus. That is amazing, isn’t it? But it’s actually even more amazing than that. Our English translation does not do justice to the original Greek. The Greeks had different meanings and multiple words for love. When Jesus first asks Peter, “Do you love me?” He uses the word ‘agape’ which means complete, self-sacrificing love for the good of the other. When Peter responds “Yes Lord, I love you.” He uses the word ‘filio’ which means a brotherly love, something akin to “I like you Lord”.

When Jesus asks Peter, “Do you love me?” the second time, He again uses the word ‘agape’ and Peter responds “Yes Lord, I love you,” again using the word ‘filio’. When Jesus asks Peter the third time, He really asks, “Do you like me?” He meets Peter where Peter is at. You can hear the dejection in Peter’s response, “Lord, you know everything; you know that I like you.” Peter is honestly admitting he is not yet ready to give himself totally to Jesus, and it’s OK. Jesus still loves Peter and will wait patiently for Peter to be able to love Him more fully. This wonderful exchange highlights the reason for Peter’s hope. It puts on full display the mercy of our Lord who meets us where we are, who loves us where we are.

Recently, I was blessed to serve on Rachel’s Vineyard which is a Christ-centered, three-day, healing weekend retreat for women and men who struggle with past abortions. On Friday, I see people weighed down with tremendous guilt, regret, and shame. They are scarred by depression, addiction, suicide attempts, and failed marriages. Worst of all, they are plagued by the belief that they’ve committed the unforgivable sin. Their pain is palpable, visceral, hideous.

Throughout the weekend, a miraculous transformation begins. What was unspeakable, can now be talked about. What was in the dark for years, even decades, is brought out into the light. Pent up emotions are expelled and an ocean of tears flows like a torrent from each of the participants. By the third day, a resurrection occurs. Women and men who were dead inside, have, by the grace of God, been blessed with a new life; a life where they not only believe that God loves them and forgives them, they know it. They have even begun the process of forgiving themselves. For them, God’s mercy is real. The Holy Spirit burns brightly inside each of them. They leave boldly acknowledging the reason for their hope.

Peter was eventually filled with the Holy Spirit who strengthened him to lead the early Church. The Holy Spirit healed the women and men from their abortions. The advocate that Jesus promised He would send to counsel us, to comfort us, to strengthen us, is the Holy Spirit here with us, and in us, today. In the gospel, Jesus proclaims this astounding truth; “I am in the Father, and you are in me, and I in you.” In you? In me? I know me. I am exceedingly aware of my faults, darkness, and doubts...and God still meets me, and you, where we are at, and He still loves us. And that, knowing Jesus loved Peter, seeing how He healed the women and men on the Rachel’s Vineyard retreat, believing that He feeds me and strengthens me with His very body and blood in the Eucharist, that is the reason for my hope.

What is the reason...for your hope?

## **The Road to Emmaus: My Journey from the Abortion Clinic to the Eucharist By Sarah J**

My journey began many years ago when I walked out of the abortion clinic. I had just aborted my daughter.

There were protesters out in front of the abortion center, so we were escorted out the back door. My ride had driven her car around back to come and meet me. As I began my journey to the car, I passed the large dumpster where the clinic tossed the remnants of my baby.

This is where my walk to Emmaus begins.

I went home that day and tried to be normal, processing the many feelings of relief and guilt. I am not sure why both of those feelings felt so appropriate. As the day wore on the guilt overpowered the relief. I vowed that I would never share what I had done earlier in the day. That pain was mine alone.

My Road to Emmaus was full of twists and turns and deeply held secrets. While I know now that it was Jesus walking alongside me, it would take many years to recognize Him.

As I journeyed from the abortion clinic, every day I took a step further away and tried to forget what I had done. I married, got pregnant again and rather than backtrack to the abortion clinic I stayed on the Road to Emmaus. I became a mother to a son.

I was raised Catholic. The day I left the abortion clinic was also the day I left the church. Now that I had a son, I felt a responsibility to have him baptized. I called a Catholic Priest. After telling him what I had done and asking for a time for Confession the priest hung up on me.

I knew that I was unforgivable and that I was not welcome back.

I did get my son baptized. Four years later I had another son. Once again, I sought baptism. I tried to teach my boys the Catholic faith. I failed. It was hard teaching them a faith I was not able to live out. So, I joined a protestant church.

I began to thrive and grow in God's word. One Sunday the preacher was talking about a God that I wanted to know. The merciful and compassionate God. So, I raised my hand and said yes to the Lord. I became pregnant. I felt so blessed to have a baby girl since I aborted my first girl.

I began to study God's word and was beginning to realize that on my Road to Emmaus Jesus was with me.

But something was missing.

I still did not feel worthy or forgiven and I kept backtracking on my Road to Emmaus to my experience at that abortion clinic. I had to talk to someone about my secret.

I wanted to go to Confession, but I had already been rejected. The protestant church kept encouraging me to just ask the Lord for forgiveness. I cannot tell you how many times I was on my knees begging the Lord for forgiveness.

Nothing gave me any sense of peace or feeling of forgiveness. I was not forgivable and even though I went to church I would always be that person with the scarlet letter.

There was another longing in my heart: I desired to receive the Eucharist. When the protestant church had communion on Sunday, I always left feeling rather empty and longing. I wanted to go back to the Catholic Church, but I was not worthy.

I got online and found a program in the Catholic Church called Project Rachel. I spoke with a counselor about my abortion. I did not feel condemned, but accepted and understood. She encouraged me to attend a Rachel's Vineyard Retreat. I rejected that idea for several years until I finally had the courage to go.

When I arrived at the retreat, the priest and the team assured me that I was safe. The priest was not going to reject me. I was given the opportunity to share my story without judgement.

The most significant part of the Rachel's Vineyard retreat was that I entered into the Sacrament of Confession. The priest did not judge or reject me.

That evening I was introduced to Adoration. Sitting before the Blessed Sacrament after my confession was the most peace I had felt in many years. The next day when I received the Eucharist during the Sunday Mass, I knew I was home. I had arrived in Emmaus, I recognized Him. The gift of his Body and Blood was given for my sins.

While my journey continues, I know Jesus walks alongside me. The Eucharist is the center of my life. I find strength in Adoration and daily Mass and frequent Confession.

All are gifts of the Church to strengthen me on my Road to Emmaus.
